The Volleyball program at Our Lady of Tepeyac High School has had a solid start. With two teams of 15 girls each, it is one of the largest programs OLT has had in recent memory. Coaches Christina Motley and Samantha Rill see potential in the Varsity team with the introduction of the JV team members who won 3rd place in the Conference last season. Juniors Giselle Esparza, Jocelyn Balderas, Sadie Bueno, and Ariana Mendez are bringing their grit and determination to a team filled with seniors, most of whom have played for four years. So far, the newly minted varsity players aren't letting their nerves get the best of them on the court. Varsity kicked off their season with a home opener 2-0 win, and while they've faced some tough opponents since, they continue to rally around each other and fight their way back into the game each time.

The coaching staff is incredibly excited for the JV team. "We had so many freshwomen come out for the team during tryouts," Coach Christins Motley says, "so we can start aiming for Conference champs now. Diamond Young, Jocelyn Serment, and Yuliana Raygoza are already dominating for us, but the other girls are getting into their own strides and gaining confidence the more games we play, so it's really great to see that teamwork and chemistry grow." Raygoza is also training to be the team's libero, a unique position within volleyball that OLT hasn't had the opportunity to use in a couple of years. She and teammate Mariah Gladney work well defensively when subbing on and off the court, and contributed to a couple of winning sets. The JV has only lost one game thus far in the season; they otherwise continue to dominate in their first two sets to win after win.


